Vision

Santa Fe County's Open Space, Trails and Parks Program sustainably manages and conserves a vibrant network of cultural, historical, recreational and natural community resources that inspire a deep sense of regional identity and stewardship among current and future generations.

Mission

Santa Fe County provides innovative leadership in local land management and conservation that enhances the quality of life for County residents, provides access to public lands for unique outdoor experiences, advances community stewardship through partnerships and effectively leverages community investments in the Open Space, Trails and Parks Program. Management of County open spaces and trail networks provides sustainable and resilient ecosystems with landscapewide benefits for human, plant, and wildlife communities.

At the beginning of 2019, Santa Fe County Board of County Commissioners unanimously adopted the Open Space and Trails Strategic Management Plan which is a guidance document for implementation of Open Space, Trails and Parks (OSTP) programs and projects. The plan also provides clear and transparent information regarding the vision and goals for OSTP, which includes a better framework for communicating annually with the public. The OSTP Strategic Management Plan Year 1 work plan is an ambitious first attempt at outlining the priority projects to be implemented by OSTP staff and partners.

This annual report document is a follow up to the 2019 OSTP Strategic Management Plan. The intention of this annual report is to provide highlights of projects accomplished in accordance with the 2019 work plan and to outline the next year of focus projects for the OSTP program.

We hope that as you read through the following pages of this annual report you can reflect on the significant accomplishments of 2019. 2020 is another big year for OSTP, as we celebrate the 20th anniversary of the program. This 20th anniversary provides a huge reason to celebrate-- from the accomplishments of the early volunteers who guided the original property purchases; to the communities who have provided input in our planning phases; to everyone who continues to support the work that OSTP strives to do in 2020-- and beyond. PROPERTY HIGHLIGHT: LOS POTREROS OPEN SPACE

Following the adoption of the Los Potreros Open Space Management Plan in 2015, Santa Fe County staff began the process of restoring the "Potrero" or pasture using a technique called "Keyline Design". Keyline Design is a type of dry land farming technique that intends to spread water across the landscape from wetter to drier places by force of gravity. Approximately 900 pounds of seed including annual, biannual and perennial seeds of warm and cool season grasses, grains, wildflowers, and legumes were also used at this time to regenerate the soil. The species were selected based on their specific capacities for regenerating the soil structure, cover, chemistry and microbial life.

This project was an incredible success! In the spring of 2019, approximately 90% of the planted area had plant cover from the seed mix. To follow up on this achievement, a phase II project commenced in the fall of 2019. This second phase was intended to enhance the water conveyance through the ditches through the upper potrero and completing up on a second series of seed planting for additional soil enhancement.



PROPERTY HIGHLIGHT: TALAYA HILL OPEN SPACE

The Open Space and Trails Program collaborated with the Santa Fe County Fire Department Wildland Division to balance bird conservation with the reduction of high-severity wildfire risk at the Talaya Hill Open Space. Talaya Hill Open Space is located in a wildland urban interface (WUI) between the outskirts of the City of Santa Fe and the Santa Fe National Forest near the Santa Fe municipal watershed. It has been identified by fire experts as an important property to reduce fire risk for the protection of the Santa Fe municipal watershed and reservoirs. Bird species of high conservation concern also use the property, including the Pinyon Jay and Grace's Warbler.

Balancing these two very important goals, wildlife conservation and watershed projection, was a unique opportunity for collaboration between non-traditional partners. Both entities engaged in developing a plan of action to balance wildlife conservation needs with the need to reduce high-severity wildfire risk and protect the Santa Fe municipal watershed. Continued communication between the Open Space and Trails staff and the Wildland Division keeps this project moving forward.

This project has been highlighted by the North American Bird Conservation Initiative as a model project for wildlife conservation and fire hazard reduction initiatives in the Southwest region



PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: SANTA FE RAIL TRAIL

Santa Fe County Open Space and Trails Program applied for and received Transportation Alternative Grant Funds for the Santa Fe Rail Trail and the Arroyo Hondo Trail in 2019. This grant amount includes approximately \$500,000 for completion of Santa Fe Rail Trail Segment 6 (from Avenida Eldorado to Spur Ranch Road). This segment is currently under construction with plans to open in 2020.



PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: ARROYO HONDO TRAIL



Approximately \$3.8 million was granted for segments 2, 3 and 4 of the Arroyo Hondo Trail. The first segment under construction starts at the Rancho Viejo Fire Station and connects to La Pradera Trails and to the Diverging Diamond Interchange. The other two segments will connect the Arroyo Hondo Trail from the Santa Fe Community College to the Turquoise Trail.



Construction of Phase III of the Pojoaque Valley Recreation Complex began in 2019. This phase includes improvements that focus largely on providing additional amenities and storage for league-related activities and transitioning the park to a community park with a more diverse array of park offerings to appeal to a broader section of the community, including playgrounds, picnic shelters (large group shelter, medium group shelter), shaded picnic areas, seating, a perimeter walking path, and an orchard / agricultural demonstration garden.

COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT: MASTER NATURALIST PROGRAM



Santa Fe County Open Space and Trails Program partnered with Santa Fe Botanical Garden and Randall Davey Audubon to host the Northern New Mexico Master Naturalist Class. This class includes several weeks of in-depth, rigorous training for folks interested in resource management. Graduates of the program volunteer on partner agency projects, including Santa Fe County Open Space.

Santa Fe County Open Space has utilized Master Naturalist Volunteers and graduates to conduct horned lizard surveys, amphibian surveys, and rare cactus surveys. These activities have included more than 200 hours of volunteer time. This program will be expanding in 2020 to include more than 12 additional volunteers.



COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT: SANTA FE WATERSHED SANTA FE RIVER RESTORATION

The Santa Fe Watershed Association partnered with Santa Fe County Open Space and Trails to conduct restoration work along the Santa Fe River.



The Santa Fe Watershed Association works really hard to keep the Santa Fe River healthy and clean, organizing several volunteer work days throughout the year. These events are critical in assisting Open Space staff in education, resource management, and maintenance along the Santa Fe River.



Volunteers planted 146 trees and have worked to keep them watered and healthy while they establish in the riparian corridor.
